

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# FOREWARD

The visual record of Taranaki from the first settlement by the Plymouth Company to the mid 1860's relies almost entirely on artists passing through the province and on a handful of local residents.

These artists have left us with their impressions of the embryonic settlement of New Plymouth, the surrounding district and some of the events which forged the beginings of the modern Taranaki.

This exhibition drawn from the collections held by both the Taranaki Museum and the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery are predominatly a representive selection of our early resident artists.

Many of the works by itinerant artists such as Heaphy, Maplestone, Fox and Strutt are not represented here but are held in public institutions in the main centres. Of singular importance locally are Edwin Harris, a Plymouth Company draughtsman, who arrived in the province in 1841 on the first of the Company ships, William Bryan, and the Ardens, father and son, Hamar Humphrey and Francis Hamar who arrived in 1853.

The wars of the 1860's saw a further influx of artists - this time associated with the Imperial Regiments - but works by Gold, Warre and Williams are not well represented in our local collections.

Although the first photographic view of New Plymouth dates from 1859 photography was not common in the province until the late 1860's or early 1870's. With its introduction the documentary value of paintings and sketches begins to diminish until by late in the century the photographic record is, in historical terms, paramount.

A number of the Museum's paintings in this exhibition have not been shown since their recent restoration at the Dunedin Public Art Gallery.

The works which emerged from the process have regained much of their original charm and vibrancy although the passage of time and, in some cases, neglect have unfortunately taken their toll.

We trust that this exhibition will draw attention to the considerable provincial holdings of early watercolours and their importance to our local history and artistic heritage.

# FRANCIS HAMAR ARDEN, 1841 - 1899

The Airedale left Manukau on 13 February 1871 with English mails bound for Taranaki and Southern ports. The Airedale struck a reef near Taniwha Point, a mile north of Waitara, at 3.35am, 14 February, 1871.

The Airedale was a brig-rigged steamer of 363 gross tons, built of iron at South Stockton in 1857. It was 169 feet in length, had a 23 foot beam and a depth of 13 feet. At the time of the wreck it was owned by Henderson and MacFarlane of Auckland, insured for 6,000 pounds and was captained by H. Kenny.

The figures are members of the Hempton family. Thomas and Jack Hempton and Annie and Alice Hempton. Thomas Hempton was a Captain and Pay Master in Militia and subsequently the second Town Clerk of New Plymouth.

The launching of the <u>Taranaki</u> in April 1855. Built of local timbers from bush on Barrett Road the Taranaki was designed along the lines of an English revenue cutter. She was wrecked on a trading voyage in the Pacific Islands a year or so later.

No. 971 Taranaki Museum Major Pratt's sapping campaign, which eventually resulted in the surrender of Maori forces at Pukerangiora in March 1861, was considered too slow and methodical by the local populace. The end of the sap shown here may still be viewed within the Pukerangiora Historic Reserve. Earth excavated from the trench was used to fill supplejack gabions (baskets) which raised the parapet by several feet.

With the outbreak of hostilities in 1860 the two settler-built stockades at Bell Block and Omata became strategically important military posts designed to protect the local residents.

Maori resistance to Government land acquisition led to the Parihaka campaign of 1881 when the Maori leaders, Te Whiti O Rongomai and Tohi Kakahi were arrested by a large force of Armed Constabulary and Volunteers.

Before the construction of the port at Moturoa, ships lightered ashore their passengers and cargo near the Huatoki. This is reputed to be one of the last such occasions before the port came into general use.

Built near the site of the Maori fortress of Tataraimaka, Fort St George was one of the several out posts constructed during the re-occupation of the Tataraimaka Block - 1863.

The pa itself known to the occupying troops as the "Crows Nest" was also fortified and served as a signal station.

This area, near the mouth of the Huatoki River, was the site of the early 'port' of New Plymouth as it was here that cargo and passengers were lightered ashore.

Richard Brown's store is to be seen in the foreground. Across the river is the Kawau kainga and the Maori Church where Bishop Selwyn is reputed to have preached his first sermon in Taranaki.

The home of James Craig Sharland, near the site of the present West End School. Sharland eventually moved to Auckland to found the well known firm of Sharland & Co.

The Marsland Hill barracks were erected in 1855 after importation from Australia.

The site, originally the pa Pukaka, was levelled in 1855 and during the excavations one of Taranaki's minor mysteries in the form of a coffin containing a body in full naval uniform was unearthed.

The origin of the body has never been satisfactorily explained.

#### 24. THE WRECK OF THE LARD WORSLEY, 1862

On September 1, 1862 the <u>Lord Worsley</u> was wrecked near Opunake on her passage from Nelson to New Plymouth. Fears were held for the safety of the passengers and crew because the area was held by Maori forces. All were, however, well treated and eventually escourted to New Plymouth.

One of the masks from the <u>Lord Worsley</u> is reputed to have been used as the first of the niu poles around which Te Va's Pai Mairire followers based their ceremonies.

The first of the Plymouth Company ships the William Bryan arrived off Taranaki on the 30 March 1841 after leaving Plymouth Sound on 19 November 1840.

The first Waiwakaiho bridge was constructed in 1842 after the wreck of the Fifeshire at Nelson. Chains from this ship were used to erect the suspension bridge shown here. The pukatea piers collapsed in 1848 and the bridge washed away. It was to be a further 10 years before a replacement was completed.

In early June 1844 Commissioner William Spain was in New Plymouth to investigate the land claims of the New Zealand company. The meetings were held on Mt Eliot (near the present Taranaki Club) and may be seen in progress to the left of the painting.

During 1860 New Plymouth became an armed camp with thousands of troops and civilians in overcrowded conditions within the town. Dysentry and typhoid eventually forced the authorities to evacuate several hundred civilians to Nelson.

The relationship between regular troops and the locally raised Militia was often vitriolic during the first years of the wars. The British commanders prefered the local troops to participate only in picquet duty and base operations instead of taking part in field operations.

The steam sloop "Victoria" is seen here disembarking General Pratt, Lt. Col. Carey and 50 men of the 40th Regiment. Other vessels in the roadstead are the paddlesteamer "Tasmanian Maid", the "George Henderson" and the "Airdale".

The Omata Stockade was situated above the Herekawe Stream on the outskirts of New Plymouth. It was built by local settlers early in 1860 in response to rising tension between Maori and Pakeha over the proposed Waitara land purchase. Before historical times the site was occupied by a Maori pa Ngaturi.

In 1834 HMS Alligator was sent from Australia to effect the rescue of the crew of the trading vessel Harriel which was wrecked near Cape Egmont. The incident resulted in the first clash between Maori and Imperial troops.
