This story will give you an idea of what to expect during a visit to the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery.




Whare whakairo toi Art Gallery

Tomokanga Entrance



A school bus, or a car will park near the art gallery entrance.


I will enter the building through the automatic sliding glass doors at the front.

Just like at school, the gallery has some rules:


- I will raise my hand and wait patiently if I have something to say or ask a question

- I will be quiet so that others can enjoy the gallery
- Only art gallery staff can touch the artworks so I will keep my hands by my side
- I will only eat or drink in the classroom

Ngā mahi toi Art



There are many different kinds of art works on display. Some move fast and can make loud noises and have bright lights. The art works are safe, however, it is a good idea to tell a teacher or an adult if I feel uncomfortable.

Ngā waahi o te Whare whakairo toi Gallery spaces



Some artworks make sounds which can be heard from a distance. Some rooms may also be dark, but they are safe. It is a good idea to stay close to a teacher or an adult and let them know if I feel uncomfortable.

Mahi toi ā kopa Classroom art




We may visit the classroom and make our own art. Some materials have a strong smell and may make our hands dirty. This is okay as there is a tap for washing hands afterwards. Food and drink is allowed in this room.

Waahi Wharepaku/Whakangā Toilets/Rest area.



If I need to use the toilet or need a quiet space to go I will let an adult or teacher know and they can take me there.

Panoni mahi toi Change of artworks



The art gallery often changes the artworks. If artworks are being changed, I might see and hear staff drilling holes or making loud noises. There may even be the smell of paint.

Wā wehenga Leaving the Gallery



When the visit is finished I will collect my bag and wait patiently for the school bus or an adult to take me back to school.
